## Class Rules:

## Absence Policy

If you miss a class for any reason, here's what to do:
$\square$ Check Edmodo or my website for any handouts or assignments you missed. I will give you any necessary hard copies of if printing them on your own is an issue, and I will chat with you about when to make up any missed tests, quizzes, or lessons.

- Immediately turn in any projects or assignments that were due on the day(s) you were absent. (3 days grace period for this work)
$\square$ Do not rely on friends. They might forget important details.
$\square$ Be prepare to take a missed test or quiz ASAP. You are not guaranteed extra days to study as all tests and quizzes are announced well in advance of the assessment date.


## Snow Day Policy

If there's a chance we will have a snow day, please bring home all of the school supplies you will possibly need to do work from home. Not having a paper or book will not be grounds for an extension on a due date.

If we have a snow day, then we will resume our planned due dates as quickly as possible. For example, if we were supposed to take a test or quiz on the cancelled day, then it will happen on the next possible school day. If an assignment was due on the snow day, then it will be due the next possible school day.

For example, if we miss school on Tuesday, anything scheduled for Tuesday is now on Wednesday. (If we miss Friday, it's due Monday.)

If we have a snow day on the day before a test or due date, then the normal test or due date will still happen on the originally scheduled date. Assessments will not be pushed back for extra study or homework time!

## Finding \& Using Books for Independent Reading

In this class, you will need to find and carry an independent reading book with you to every English class.
(More details about our independent reading requirements are on another paper.)

The books you choose must be:
] School appropriate
$\square$ Ones that your parents would approve of
$\square$ An appropriate length
An appropriate reading level (not too easy or difficult)

If you ever need help finding a book, I can recommend some. However, it's a good life skill to not just rely on a teacher. Please also ask a friend or librarian!

If I have a concern about a book you're reading, I'm allowed to "veto" it or contact your parent(s) or guardians

## Document Formatting

Anytime you are submitting a typed document (either printing it or turning in electronically), make sure it includes the following MLA guidelines:

- Running header, upper left corner, with last name and page \#
- Heading on first page (left), containing your name, class period, and due date
- Centered title
- $1^{\prime \prime}$ margins
- Double spacing
- Times New Roman 12
- No extra spaces between paragraphs (or between headings and titles)
- No excessive spacing, bolding, italics, or photos


## Revision Policy

Even professional writers usually don't do well on the first draft, so our class has a standard revision policy for writing (such as essays, narratives, and extended writing projects).

If you wish to raise a grade on a piece of writing, you may get ONE chance to raise it. Please turn in a revised copy within FIVE SCHOOL DAYS of receiving that grade. (For example, if you receive an assignment grade on Tuesday, then you have until the end of the period on the next Monday to turn in your revisions.)

If you do not meet the five-day deadline or do not succeed in turning in a draft that is actually better, then you are not given additional chances.

If you're ever unsure about what to revise or how, please see me and do not wait until the last minute.

## Cell Phone Policy

Having a Cell Phone in class is a privilege NOT a right. Abuse of this cell phone use policy will result in no phones being allowed in class for the offender for the remainder of the marking period.
1). Cell Phones will be placed in the appropriate bin at the front of the room at the start of class or in the cell phone charging area in the back of the room before class starts.
2). If cell phones are to be used for the lesson, I will call you up by table to retrieve your phone; however, every student has access to a laptop and cell phones will not be necessary to participate in any lesson.
3). Cell phones may be used at the end of class once ALL exit assignments have been collected, laptops have been stored properly, and books have been placed in the assigned cubby. All students must be finished before they may be used.
4) AT ANY TIME, I reserve the right to revoke your cell phone privileges.

## Edmodo

Edmodo will be used in this class as an online classroom. If you are absent, please check Edmodo for any handouts, assignments, or links we worked with in class.

- Each of my classes has a separate Edmodo code. You may be in more than one of my classes and will have more than one code. You may add additional class codes once you have logged in the first time.
$\square$ DO NOT use Edmodo as a personal chat room. I am the admin and I see all messages sent and must approve them to post. Unnecessary posts of a social nature will be deleted and abuse of this will result in disciplinary.
$\square$ DO write down your log-in information somewhere safe. I can not retrieve your password, I can only reset it.
$\square$ We will not be using the online Edmodo assignment, quizzes, or gradebook unless you are on homebound instruction or will be absent for an extended period.


## Grading

This class uses a total points system. Students will be evaluated for growth of knowledge in two ways.

- Writing Prompts will be daily or almost daily -5 points
- Exit Tickets - 3 points
- Class Participation - 1 point daily
- Practice Assignments - 5-10 points


## Summative

- End of Unit assessments will consist of either Projects, Essays, or Tests : 100 points
- Quizzes - 10-30 points depending on piece of literature being evaluated
- Independent Reading Interviews - 100 points
